From the Head Table

'As the call, so is the echo' is an old saying that gives a lot of insights to us even in these most modern days of human life. This is what Sir Isaac Newton said in his third law of motion: 'For every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction'. There is an interconnectedness between each action and its effect. It is true in the day-to-day experience of human life. This can be considered as ethics of reciprocity. If we are conscious of this fact, we would do only good things to others as it is clear that 'what goes around comes around'. The Holy Bible presents this principle of practical life in simple words - 'Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven.' (Luke 6: 37).

Everyone, even a small child, expects respect and would like to be respected. But, we seldom think that it is a *'give and take'* policy in most cases. We would like to be respected, but, at the same time, we often fail to give back respect. One of the causes attributed to the eighteen days Mahabharata war (Kurukshetra war) between Kauravas and Pandavas is the disrespect and humiliation meted out to Draupathy by the Kauravas. This is also true in many other wars between countries or family feuds or individual squabbles.

Thiruvalluvar, the great Tamil poet and philosopher, says in

திருக்குறள் – 962: "சீரினும் சீரல்ல செய்யாரே சீரொடு பேராண்மை வேண்டு பவர்.". (seerinum seeralla seyyaarae seerodu paeraaNmai vaendu pavar). The couplet means: 'Those who desire to maintain their honour, will surely do nothing dishonourable, even for the sake of fame.' The renowned golden rule says, 'In everything, do to others as you would have them do to you.' (Mt 7:12a). We have to respect and recognize the dignity of the other irrespective of their caste, creed, colour, etc.

As responsible people, we are duty-bound to prepare ourselves as well as our younger generation to respect our fellow beings. The elderly people are to be respected by our younger ones. Going further, we have to learn to respect nature. It is all the more important in these days of excessive exploitation of Mother Earth. Pope Francis says, 'Listen to the cry of the Earth.' (Laudato Si). Therefore, let us learn how to give respect and dignity 'and if you and I do so, it will be given to us. 'A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back' (Luke 6:38).

Principal's Press



The virtue of respect is closely related to the Golden Rule outlined in St. Mathew's Gospel, where the principle of 'treating others as we want to be treated' is stated. It involves treating people with dignity and caring for them. It means valuing both others and ourselves. A respectable person listens to others, is patient and considerate, courteous and polite, cares about others' rights, and is interested in "creating a climate of goodness" wherever s/he is. From childhood, we have been taught "give respect and take respect" to ensure that everyone is respected equally as a part of the definition of brotherhood and humanity. It means treating people the way we want to be treated and talking to people the way we want to be talked to. Respect is earned, not given. Franklin D Roosevelt says, "If you treat people right, they will treat you right...ninety percent of the time." Having this awareness will lead us to give and receive respect in an amicable manner.

Disrespect, the polar opposite of respect, can be explained by an ancient inhuman practice of untouchability (i.e. the practice of discriminating individuals and groups based on their caste and the jobs they performed) that existed in our nation. People from the lower castes were treated more harshly than animals; there was no respect, and their dignity was not respected. In those days when such evils were practised, Adi Sankaracharya and his disciples were on their way to the temple after bathing in the Ganges. On the way, they saw a

Chandala (an outcaste) with four dogs standing in their path. As Brahmins were not allowed to touch Chandalas in those days, the saint asked him to move away. The Chandala turned around and asked: "To whom are you asking to move? To my body or to the God within me? How will you become impure by touching me? How do you differentiate between a Brahmin and a Chandala? Because both of our bodies are made of the same elements; earth, water, fire, air and space, even though we look different. So, tell me, when the same God dwells in you and me, how can you ask me to move away and not touch you?" After hearing this, Adi Sankara prostrated before the Chandala and composed *Manisha Panchaka*. We learn from this incident that we should accept, cherish and respect each other's dignity since everyone possesses the same divine presence.

In India, we follow the custom of greeting each other with Namaste. This means the Divine in me honours the Divine in you. If two individuals meet together and greet each other Namaste, this means that they are uttering "may our minds connect", this is the reason why the palms should be folded and placed near the chest when greeting. The act of bowing down is a way of showing humility, respect, and love toward one's fellow human. We greet each other with Namaste in our schools, families, and other places. Our nation gives such importance to respecting others. However, in comparison to older generations, the modern generation seems to lack respect. Dear parents and teachers, we need to find out the reasons for that and teach them the importance and benefits of respect. Dear students, you can respect your elders by listening to what they are saying. Listening to someone makes them feel special, and obeying them makes you responsible. And their blessings will permanently save you from negativity. Respect not only the elders but also the peers by accepting their strengths and weaknesses and not discriminating against them. If you do so, you will be a precious person in their lives.

CHILDREN'S DAY CELEBRATION


"Children are the world's most valuable resources and its best hope for the future."




MONTHLY STAFF WEBINAR
